

**PLEASE NOTE:** No student is eligible to attend HUG who is currently on academic, chapel or disciplinary probation on the Searcy campus. Any student who has applied and/or been accepted will automatically become ineligible if placed on any type of probation up until time to depart. Such individuals will be placed on a waiting list and may go only if there are openings after probation has been removed. In addition, a student must have an overall 2.0 GPA.

**IMPORTANT INFORMATION AS YOU PLAN YOUR HUG SCHEDULE**

- HUG students are charged for 16 credit hours\*
- HUG Summer 2010 is for Bible majors
- Eight semesters of Bible are required by the University for graduation. Students who complete two Bible courses at HUG will have one of their later semesters of the Bible requirement waived.

**Modern Greek (MGRK) 100 – Modern Greek (3) Ms. Vicky Tsakou**

**Offered on Sufficient Demand.** An introduction to modern Greek language and culture. Emphasis is given to basic grammatical structures and to oral communication in everyday situations. *(Fulfills 3 of the 6 hours required for Global Literacy.)*

**HUM 273. World Civilization and Humanities. (2-6) Mr. Tim Brinley**

**Offered on Sufficient Demand.** An integration of the disciplines of art, drama, history, literature, music, philosophy, religion, and science, and their influence in shaping ideas and values in the selected area of the world. The course content will reflect the context in which it will be taught. **May substitute for 2-6 hours selected from the following: ART 101 (3 hrs), BIOL 250 (3 hrs), ENG 201 or 202 (3 hrs), HIST 110 or 111 (3 hrs), MUS 101 (3 hrs), PHIL 251 (3 hrs), COMT 101 (3 hrs), or up to 3 credits of global literacy.** Determine how you intend to apply the credits, then enroll in the appropriate number of hours. (Example: Student wants credit for ENG 201 and MUS 101; therefore, will enroll in 6 credit hours.) Credit may not be increased after the semester is completed. After the semester abroad, students may apply the credits to the appropriate course(s). *NOTE: This course may not be used to raise a grade in any course previously taken. This course may be repeated for credit, up to a maximum of 12 hours, provided the course is taken at different locations*

**Humanities (HUM) 201 – International Studies (1-3) Mrs. Rebecca Brinley**

**Offered on Sufficient Demand.** Preparation for international experience in living and studying abroad. Enhancement in cultural sensitivity and practical matters of survival in a different cultural setting. Research on the host country. *Fulfills 1-3 credits of the 6 hours required for Global Literacy.*

**Bible – Historical – (BHIS) 340 – Church History I (2 or 3) Dr. Daniel Stockstill**

A survey of the history of Christianity from the subapostolic age to the Protestant Reformation, with attention to the events, institutions, people and doctrines that have shaped the church.

**Bible – Historical (BHIS) 347 – Biblical Archaeology Field Work /Practicum (3) Dr. Dale Manor**

Offered only in summer and in Israel. A hands-on, on-site course in archaeological technique and analysis as they apply to a site from the biblical period and which relates to biblical history. The student will be guided through the basics of archaeological theory and practice, including excavation and analysis of finds. In addition, the student will be guided in the interpretation of the data as they relate to the biblical periods. Before enrolling in the course, the student must submit an application for participation to the faculty guide. *Should the student desire global literacy credit for this course, enrollment in BHIS 347 and co-requisite enrollment in BHIS 348 are necessary.*

**Bible – Historical (BHIS) 348 – Archaeology and Geography of Israel (3) Dr. Dale Manor**

Offered only in summer and in Israel. This course examines the historical, cultural, geographical and religious contexts of events in the Old and New Testaments and in the Intertestamental period. It consists of lectures, readings and on-site travel to excavation sites, museums and geographical features of Israel. Co-requisite: BHIS 347. *Should the student desire global literature credit (only 3 hours of such is permitted) both BHIS 347 (3 hours credit required) and BHIS 348 must be taken concurrently.*

**Bible – Ministry (BMIN) 325 – Introduction to Preaching (3) Dr. Philip Thompson**

An introduction to the philosophies of preaching, what a sermon is, types of messages, sermon design and development, illustrating and applying the message, and sermon delivery. A concurrent laboratory is required.

**Bible – Youth and Family Education (BYFE) 338 – The Christian Home (2) Dr. Phillip Thompson**

The course examines a Christian approach to selecting a marriage partner and living with that partner in permanent monogamy, the biblical principles bearing upon intra-family relationships, and the family as an instrument of Christian service.

**Bible – Old Testament (BOLD) 304 – Israelite History: Joshua through Esther (2 or 3) Dr. Daniel Stockstill**

A study of Israel's attempt to walk in covenant with God from selected passages of the historical books ranging from Joshua's conquest of Canaan through the return of Jews from Babylonian exile.

**Bible - New Testament (BNEW) 313 – Paul (2 or 3) Dr. Philip Thompson**

The figure of Paul in the New Testament – as apostle, Roman citizen, missionary. Selected passages from Acts of the Apostles and Paul's letters are examined. Background material relating to his apostleship to the Gentiles is examined in Europe and the Middle East.

**Biblical Language – Greek (GRK) 271 – The Gospel of John (3) Dr. Daniel Stockstill**

The course involves the reading of the Greek text of the Gospel of John with further study of grammar and vocabulary, as well as exegesis of selected passages. Prerequisites: 171, 172. Students who take the course for graduate credit arranged through Harding Graduate School of Religion will be required to do additional work with the instructor.

**Bible - Missions (BMIS) 280 – The World Christian (3) On-Line**

This introductory missions course focuses on key question about God, His world and our mission in order to foster a world Christian mindset and values. This course establishes the foundation for subsequent missions courses.

**Biology (BIOL) 111 – General Biology (3) Dr. John Moon's DVD/online course**

A lecture course in the principles of biology for students not majoring in natural sciences. *Satisfies the Liberal Arts requirement in biology, but does not count toward a major or minor in biology.*

**Biology (BIOL) 113 – Human Structure and Functions (3) Dr. John Moon's DVD/online course**

Structure and function of selected human organ systems and the cellular mechanisms and processes upon which they are based. Circulatory, digestive, nervous, musculoskeletal and respiratory systems. Designed for majors in communication disorders, dietetics, nursing, physical education and others who need an introduction to human anatomy and physiology. *Satisfies the Liberal Arts requirement in biology, but does not count toward a major or minor in biology.*

**Biology (BIOL) 250 – Environmental Science (3) Dr. John Moon's DVD/online course**

Biological knowledge of the structure and function of ecosystems; human influence on the environment. *May apply to Liberal Arts Biology credit OR to Global Literacy credit, but not for both.*

*\*A minimum of 12 credit hours must be maintained throughout the semester. If you enroll in more than 16 credit hours, you will be charged for those hours.*
