# Educational Leadership Programs – Portfolio Defense Trend Results

The content assessment is an electronic portfolio required of all degree candidates as well as candidates in a program of study. Artifacts are selected for content assessment based upon their representation of the NELP or ELCC standards. (The EPP transitioned for the four programs by 2021-2022 academic year.) The EPP utilizes an electronic portfolio software (Anthology) and all candidates are required to establish an individualized portfolio upon entry into the program. There are four customized Tables of Contents to correlate to the NELP or ELCC Standards for the EPP's various educational leadership programs. The portfolio software is prescriptive in that some course assignments and projects are required to be placed within the portfolio as a candidate progresses through the program.

Candidates are required to complete the Anthology portfolio and then make an oral presentation for the defense of their understanding and mastery of each standard in front of a panel consisting of three individuals: two faculty instructors and one practitioner. The practitioner is an area superintendent, assistant superintendent, principal, or assistant principal.
