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### KAY GOWEN RECEIVES DISTINGUISHED CHRISTIAN SERVICE AWARD

Each year at our annual Harding Bible Lectureship we are pleased to present Distinguished Christian Service awards to individuals who have made exceptional contributions to the cause of Christ. On Wednesday night (September 30) of this year's lectureship that award was given to Kay Gowen, Director of our Abundant Living ministry.

The Abundant Living ministry is a service of the Office of Church Relations, in partnership with many generous donors. Kay has led the program since 2006 and has spent countless hours and traveled many thousands of miles to promote ministry to, and with, senior Christians. She created and edits the quarterly Abundant Living magazine and serves as an invaluable resource to many individuals and churches throughout our brotherhood. Our ninth annual Abundant Living Retreat was held at Branson on October 6-9. In each of the last three years, we have had from 225 to 240 attendees from 20 states gather for four nights and three days of encouragement, inspiration, equipping and challenging older Christians to find their niche and staying active in the Kingdom. Thanks to Kay's initiative, Abundant Living now offers mini-versions of the Branson Retreat in areas throughout the nation, in partnership with local congregations. This year the mini-retreats attracted 627 participants in six locations: Clarksville, Tenn., on May 30; Searcy, Ark., Aug. 7-8; Memphis, Tenn., Aug. 15; Jackson, Tenn., Aug. 28 -29; and Mesquite, Texas, Sept. 19.

In partnership with Arthur & Sheri Shearin, Kay's office sponsored a Restoration History tour last May that attracted 56 participants.

Kay is ably supported by her husband Jim, who serves as the Director of Men's Intramurals here at Harding University.

# GLOBAL MISSIONS EXPERIENCE HOSTED AT H.U.T.



This year Harding University hosted the 55th Global Missions Experience, typically known as the World Missions Workshop. Over a thousand people from across from the United States and around the world traveled to Camp Tahkodah for a weekend of hands-on experiences in missions. The overall theme for the weekend was "Relentless". During keynote sessions and classes students were encouraged to answer the Relentless call that God has for His people. The event challenged students to Relentlessly participate in God's mission through their career, to Relentlessly serve God's purposes, and to Relentlessly seek God wherever they go. The theme verse for the conference was John 5:17, "My Father never stops working and so I keep working too."

Students from Lipscomb University, Freed-Hardeman University, Faulkner University, Ohio Valley University, Oklahoma Christian, Summit Christian College, York College, Pepperdine University, Adventures in Missions, Crowley's Ridge College, and current and alumni Harding students attended. Over the course of the weekend there were six keynote presentations taught by missionaries each with experience on a different continent. Classes, learning stations, and simulations were taught by sixty presenters representing over thirty countries.

This event, unique to Harding University, housed students in Tahkodah's Global Village, which simulates the living

conditions of seven different areas from around the world. This facility provides a platform for students to learn about cross-cultural dynamics, missions principles, appropriate technology, sustainable agriculture, sharing the gospel, planting churches, working with house churches, and learning how to serve God among the poor of the world. Learning stations in the Global Village allowed to students to actively engage in training. Some stations emphasized sharing faith and having spiritual conversations, such as answering the questions of skeptics, laundromat ministries, and Discovery Bible Studies. Others highlighted development ministries such as beekeeping, cross-cultural health care education, rainwater catchment, sustainable agriculture, and water purification. In addition to all of the classes and learning stations offered at HUT 190 students stayed in the Global Village, 100 of whom stayed in the refugee camp. The rest of the weekend visitors stayed in cabins at Camp Tahkodah and in "Tent City".

The weekend culminated with a commitment service where students pledged to become full-time long term missionaries. When the call was made 229 students went to the front and placed a painted footprint on a large mural under an area of the world they feel called to serve. After they placed their footprint on the mural, missionaries from around the world washed their feet and prayed over them. e are grateful to God for the things that He has done!

## **2015 LECTURESHIP REPORT**

This year's Harding Bible Lectureship was another history-making event, with record-setting attendance on three of the four nights of the program. Had it not been for last year's overflowing crowd on Sunday night, when we had Alan Robertson speak, this would have been our largest lectureship attendance ever. (Or, to put it another way, this year's program was the biggest Harding Bible Lectureship without a speaker from "Duck Dynasty" on the schedule!)
