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The Kerusso Experience

In the summer of 2016, the Harding University Center for Preaching sponsored its 6th and 7th Kerusso Experiences. The Kerusso Experience is Harding's preacher training camp for ninth-to-twelfth-grade boys. The first session was held during the first week of June at Camp Ne-O-Tez in De Soto, Missouri. The second took place the first week of July at Harding's main campus in Searcy, Arkansas. Forty-four students from Alabama, Arkansas, Missouri, Tennessee, Texas, and Belize studied and preached through the Old Testament books of Hosea, Amos, and Micah. The students received copies of Jack Lewis's book, "The Minor Prophets," as part of their resources packet, and each day they were taught text and homiletics by faculty and friends of the College of Bible and Ministry.

In addition to rigorous classroom study, the boys in St. Louis enjoyed disc golf, a float trip, and a St. Louis Cardinals baseball game. In Searcy, a field trip to Memphis, Tennessee, took the boys to the Harding School of Theology and the National Civil Rights Museum. The highlight of the trip was discussing God's vision for social justice with Harold Redd, Harding board member and minister at the Midtown Church of Christ in Memphis.

As Devin Swindle,

Director of the Kerusso Experience noted, "It is one thing to listen to race-baiters talk about civil rights on political talk shows; it is quite another to listen to Harold Redd discuss life as an African-American preacher in the south."

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Plans are already being made for the next installment of Kerusso in both St. Louis and Searcy. The session at Camp Ne-O-Tez is slated for June 3-10, 2017, with special guest Ross Cochran of Harding University leading a study of the Sermon on the Mount. And yes, the Cardinals *are* in town that week. The session



in Searcy is July 1-8, featuring Harding alum Randy Harris leading the study of the Sermon.

More than 100 students have attended the Kerusso Experience since its inception in 2013. Currently, twenty-seven of those students are pursuing degrees in Bible or related fields at Harding or one of our sister institutions. Please prayerfully consider any young men from your congregation whom you feel may benefit from this week of instruction and inspiration, and offer to send them to Kerusso. The camp is not just for students interested in full-time, church supported ministry; it is for all those who are interested in serving the Lord in any capacity. The cost is \$200 per student. NEW BOOK BY DR. MONTE COX

Dr. Monte Cox spent a summer Sabbatical traveling for two months in the Far East. He was conducting research for his forthcoming book on World Religions entitled *Significant Others: Understanding Our Non-Christian Neighbors* (ACU Press, 2017). With wife Beth, the Coxes spent time in Japan, Thailand and India where they interviewed Shintoists, Hindus, Sikhs and Buddhists of various sects. They visited dozens of temples and shrines considered sacred by these non-Christian groups.

Monte reports that one of the most rewarding parts of the trip was the opportunity to visit with Christians in these nations--Christians who are few and far between in that part of the world-and learn firsthand about their journeys to faith in Christ. "The uniqueness of Christ is all the more clear and beautiful against the dark backdrop of these religious alternatives," he says.

In chapel this year Dr. Cox is presenting short synopses of the chapters of the book that are being filmed in a "Ted-talk" styled format. The videos will be made available when the book is published. "There was a time when few of us had any contact with adherents of non-Christian religions unless we traveled abroad. Now our children and grandchildren attend school with Muslims, Hindus, Buddhists, Sikhs, and others, our doctors may Muslims or Hindus, and our church members routinely interact with religious non-Christians in the work place." *Significant Others* was written for a Christian audience to help equip us for conversations with such people, conversations that are "respectful, informed and persuasive." going to <u>http://www.harding.edu/</u> events/lectureship.
