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The Legacy of Carl & Frankie Mitchell

Dr. Carl Mitchell died December 18, 2018 in Mesquite, Texas and his wife of 65 years, Frankie passed away 18 days later on January 6, 2019. Dr. Mitchell served as Dean of the College of Bible & Religion at Harding from 1989 until 2006 and then taught Bible and worked in the office of the President as a counsellor until his retirement in 2013. Frankie worked in Human Resources under Lott Tucker.

Leah and I loved Carl and Frankie Mitchell very much. A close bond was established very early in our relationship and we were privileged to travel with them overseas on many occasions. Carl and Frankie were spiritual giants and mentors for us.

One of the first projects that I collaborated closely with Dr. Mitchell on was the development of plans for the McInteer Bible & World Missions Center. Carl and I both wanted it to be the centerpiece of our work at Harding University, and we worked to create a facility which emphasized world missions. As you enter the rotunda in the McInteer Center, you'll see the Great Commission in large letters around a map of the world. Carl was always interested in sharing the good news of Christ to everyone around the world. In fact, it seems to me that missions and the names Carl and Frankie Mitchell simply are synonymous.

One of the special features of the McInteer Plaza is the fountain in the middle with a baptistery, which is patterned after one found in Ephesus. Carl first pointed out this baptistery to me and suggested it for this location.

Carl was also extremely interested in counseling with people. He helped establish the MFT program at Harding and simply insisted that I put this program into place. I seldom ever said "No" to Carl Mitchell.

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Early on, I realized that Carl had a passion for encouraging people everywhere to read the Bible through every year. Before coming to Harding, he had sponsored a steak dinner in other places where he had preached for the people who had read through the Bible. He asked me to assist him in that regard and we started having a steak dinner for Harding and at the College church, a practice which continues today. Carl always produced a daily Bible reading schedule. He included it in his Christmas cards and gave it to his friends. I remember a number of dinners when we cooked the steak outside. Carl was also quite particular and wanted the steaks cooked in just exactly the right way and -- he *seldom* thought my way was the right way.

He loved our International Programs and was instrumental in starting our work in Italy, our first campus overseas. Carl was one of the strongest proponents of International Education. On numerous occasions, we were privileged to travel to these campuses with Carl and Frankie and they were always our guides.

One personal trip that I'll always remember was a cruise to the Baltic Sea. While on the ship, as would be Carl's custom, he got a notice put in the ship's paper that on Sunday we would have the Lord's Supper for anyone who wanted to participate. We thought we might have 5-6 people in addition to the four of us. We ended up having 40 people at our service! We had to improvise with the Lord's Supper because we didn't have that many supplies with us. We had been given a bottle of wine by the ship's captain, so it became the Lord's Supper. It was difficult to get the cork out without a corkscrew, but Carl managed with his pocketknife after a LOT of effort.

On one trip, Carl was supposed to drive. He drove for two blocks and then decided that he did not want to drive so he turned this honor over to me. It was very interesting to drive in a small car for two weeks with Leah, Carl, and Frankie all telling me where to drive and where to turn. They had three maps and they seldom agreed on where I should drive. It was fun on the round-abouts.

I loved working with Frankie in Human Resources. She worked for Lott Tucker, who was an icon at Harding, and only Frankie could accomplish what she was able to do. She was able to "out-Lott" Lott Tucker, and not just anybody could do that. I could hear Frankie coming down the hallway before she ever arrived. She had a contagious personality.

On a more personal note, I seldom ever said the word "Carl" without saying the word "Frankie." They were simply inseparable. They loved each other, believed in each other, believed in the work of the Lord's kingdom, and were an example for many because of their commitment. I was always amused when we went out to eat because Carl would order his meal and Frankie would then order her meal and then almost without exception, Frankie would eat Carl's meal and Carl would eat her meal.

In addition to his love for God, and the Lord's church, it would be fair to say that Carl knew how to live life to the fullest. He loved people, and he loved to play golf and tennis. A number of us loved to play golf with him on a regular basis. One of my favorite memories would be times when he and Howard Bybee would be playing together and Keith Cronk and I would simply listen to their banter. I wish I had a recording of it – it would be priceless. Carl was always right. So was Howard.

I think it would be fair to say that Carl was one of the strongest encouragers ever to walk on Planet Earth. He strongly believed in the priesthood of all believers and believed that all people should proclaim the good news of Jesus Christ. He talked or preached this message whenever possible. He did it both in word and in example. The Mitchell Center on our campus is named in their honor because of his love for vocational missions.

Hebrews 11 is the great faith chapter in the Bible it contains a roll call of men and women who made an eternal difference through their lives of faith. If such a list were being written today, I believe Carl and Frankie Mitchell would be included among the inspiring examples of trust and endurance. In the fourth verse of chapter 11, the writer mentions Abel, observing about him, "And by faith he (Abel) still speaks, even though he is dead." This is the very definition of legacy. I believe that through faith Carl and Frankie Mitchell still speak to us today, and they will for decades to come. Heaven has gained a wonderful couple.

Session 1: June 8-13 Session 2: June 15-20 Session 3: June 22-27

Camp begins with check in on Saturday (8th, 15th, 22nd) from 1-4 PM in the McInteer lobby and runs through breakfast Thursday morning at 9 AM (13th, 20th, 27th).

In addition, Spark is our newest camp for students going into 4th grade through 6th grade. It has one session running from June 27th through June 30th. It also takes place on Harding's campus but focuses on activities, worship, and events for a younger age group to prepare for a life of faith ahead. We take the best from Uplift and bring the experience of worship and Bible study to Spark. Campers at Spark will stay in dorms monitored by our Uplift staff, Uplift counselors, and chaperones from church groups.
