

No student is eligible to attend HIZ who is currently on academic, chapel or disciplinary probation on the Searcy campus. Any student who has applied and/or been accepted will automatically become ineligible if placed on any type of probation up until time to depart. Such individuals will be placed on a waiting list and may go only if there are openings after probation has been removed. Participation in the HIZ program also requires an interview process and the successful completion of two prerequisite courses: NURS 2100 and BMIS 3020.

## IMPORTANT INFORMATION AS YOU PLAN YOUR HIZ SCHEDULE

- Required Prerequisites: (Must be completed during the semesters indicated prior to HIZ participation or gain an exemption from the appropriate dean.)
  - NURS 2100 must be taken during the spring semester prior to HIZ participation
  - BMIS 3020 must be taken during intersession prior to HIZ participation
- HUM 2730 for a total of 2-6 hours is required during the HIZ semester
- BMIS 3080 is required during the HIZ semester
- Eight semesters of Bible are required by the University for graduation. Students who complete two Bible courses at HIZ will have one of their later semesters of the Bible requirement waived.
- The proposed list is tentative. While it is our intention to offer the courses listed, changes are sometimes necessary.
- A minimum of 12 credit hours must be maintained throughout the semester. If you enroll in more than 16 credit hours, you will be charged for those hours.

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### Required Prerequisite:

#### **NURS 2100 – Skills for Health Missions (2)**

(exemption by Dean of College of Nursing)

A fundamental health mission skills course designed to prepare learners to perform basic skills in globally diverse cultural populations. Examples include first aid including CPR, health history, identification of common health problems, vital signs, principles for staying healthy and rudimentary pharmacological principles. Concepts of universal precautions and teaching/learning are emphasized. The course also includes introductory cultural anthropology concepts to prepare learners to be culturally sensitive when serving among people of diverse worldviews. (Includes weekly laboratory experiences.) The course is required for students attending the international study abroad program in Zambia (HIZ) and is tailored to meet those needs; other university students must have faculty approval before registering for the course.

### Required Prerequisite:

#### **BMIS 3020 – Development Ministry (0 or 3)**

**NOTE:** All HIZ students must enroll in and be present on-site for BMIS 388 for 0 or 3 hours during intersession prior to the fall HIZ participation. Students wanting to utilize 3 hours credit in the fall for this course must enroll in the course for 0 hours during intersession and then again for 3 hours for the fall semester at HIZ and then complete additional coursework while at HIZ to earn the three credits. This course is taught at the Global Village facility at H.U.T. Through cross-cultural simulation, the course provides hands-on training in various types of benevolent outreach to the poor, including intensive gardening, livestock management, water development and sanitation, appropriate technology, and primary health care. Students are also introduced to theological as well as strategic issues in relief and development. *Fulfills 3 credits of the 6 hours required for Global Perspectives (when enrolled in for 3 hours only).*

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### **HUM 2730 - World Civilization/Humanities (2-6) Audra Pleasant**

**REQUIRED.** An integration of the disciplines of art, drama, history, literature, music, philosophy, religion, and science, and their influence in shaping ideas and values in the selected area of the world. The course content will reflect the context in which it will be taught. Required of all students participating in an international program. May substitute for up to 6 hours selected from the following: ART 1010, THEA 1010, ENG 2010 or ENG 2020, HIST 2100 or HIST 2110, MUS 1010, PHIL 3010, or up to 3 hours of global perspectives. This course may be repeated for credit up to a maximum of 12 hours, provided the course is taken at different locations. This course may not be taken as a repeat for a completed liberal arts course or to satisfy an additional liberal arts requirement. *Determine how you intend to apply the credits, then enroll in the appropriate number of hours. (Example: Student wants credit for ENG 2010 and MUS 1010; therefore, will enroll in 6 credit hours.) Credit may not be increased after the semester is completed. After the semester abroad, students may apply the credits to the appropriate course(s).*

**HUM 2010 – International Studies (1-3) Audra Pleasant**

Preparation for international experience in living and studying abroad. Enhancement in cultural sensitivity and practical matters of survival in a different cultural setting. Approximately 30 hours of classroom instruction. Research on the host country. *Fulfills 1-3 credit hours of the 6 hours required for Global Perspectives*

**BMIS 3080 – Missionary Anthropology (3) Jerry Myhan**

**REQUIRED.** This course develops skills in understanding people and communicating the gospel in a meaningful way to them. This course equips Christian workers to cross cultural lines by comprehending culture, worldview, contextualization, and incarnational ministry. This course meets 3 hours of the Liberal Arts global perspective requirement. *Fulfills 3 credit hours of the 6 hours required for Global Perspectives.* **(Only one BMIS course may be counted for Global Perspectives.)**

**BMIS 3070/3072/3073 BMIS Field Work in Missions (1-3) Jerry Myhan**

Field work is done under the supervision of a faculty member or a person appointed by the dean in a mission field at home or abroad. Before the field work experience begins, a written proposal must be submitted to the dean for approval. May be taken more than once with consent of dean. *Fulfills 1-3 credit hours of the 6 hours required for Global Perspectives.*

**(Only one BMIS course may be counted for Global Perspectives.) HIZ Students: This course may not be taken concurrent with BMIN 4050.**

**BMIS 3020 – Development Ministry (3) David Gardner**

**NOTE:** All HIZ students must enroll in and be present on-site for BMIS 3020 for 0 or 3 hours during intersession prior to the fall HIZ participation. Students wanting to utilize 3 credit hours in the fall for this course must enroll in the course for 0 hours during intersession and then again for 3 hours for the fall semester at HIZ and then complete additional coursework while at HIZ to earn the three credits. This course is taught at the Global Village facility at H.U.T. Through cross-cultural simulation, the course provides hands-on training in various types of benevolent outreach to the poor, including intensive gardening, livestock management, water development and sanitation, appropriate technology, and primary health care. Students are also introduced to theological as well as strategic issues in relief and development. *Fulfills 3 credits of the 6 hours required for Global Perspectives, when enrolled in for 3 hours only.* **(Only one BMIS course may be counted for Global Perspectives.)**

**BMIN 4050 – Ministry Internship (1) David Gardner**

The course exists in order to give future ministers supervised, hands-on experience within a structured ministry setting. **HIZ students: This course may not be taken concurrent with BMIS 3070.**

**BOLD 2010 - Creation and Kingdom (Genesis through Esther) (2) David Gardner**

This course examines the Pentateuch and the historical books of the Old Testament introducing students to relevant historical and cultural backgrounds, Old Testament theology, biblical exegesis and applications to contemporary contexts.

**NURS 3050 – Culture of Poverty (3) Jessica Gardner**

A contemporary cross-cultural multidisciplinary course focusing on holistic ministry with individuals, groups and communities experiencing poverty in urban/rural domestic and international settings. Emphasis is on human and community development to break the poverty cycle through application of health care and Christian principles. Includes a field experience commensurate with course objectives. *Fulfills 3 credits of the 6 hours required for Global Perspectives.*

**NURS 4130 – Health Care Missions (3) Jessica Gardner**

An elective course which introduces learners to the delivery of quality, evidence-based patient-centered health care and evangelism in resource limited areas as they use health care as a means of serving vulnerable populations in the name of Christ. A variety of health problems specific to resource limited nations are explored along with fundamental cultural anthropology as learners are introduced to serving globally diverse populations in culturally sensitive ways. Development concepts, Christian worldview, partnering and learning to serve in sustainable ways are discussed. Three hours lecture per week. May be taken for Bible and global perspectives credit. The course is strongly recommended if the student plans international mission work. This course is eligible for honors credit.
